Bologna and EHEA

Prag Communiqué 2001 :

Call for more modules, courses and curricula offered in partnership with HEI from other countries and leading to joint degrees

Joint programmes relate strongly to the Bologna objectives (mobility, promoting European dimension in HE)



Characteristics of Joint Programmes

Programmes developed and approved jointly by several HEI

Students from each HEI study at the other HEI

Students' stays are of comparable length

Periods of study and exams passed at partner HEI are automatically recognised

Professors of each HEI teach also at the other HEIs and form joint commissions for admission and examination

Graduates obtain either the national degrees of each HEI or a degree awarded jointly by them

Joint Programmes – a success story?

60% of HEI say they have JP in at least one of the 3 cycles (mostly at Ma level), only 4% say they see no need for this 15% have JP in all three cycles HEI in DE, ES, FR, IT, NL and UK have the largest number of JP

BUT: very small numbers of participating students – too early to assess impact of JP

Joint Programmes – a success story?

No legal problems any more: 75% of countries have included JD in legislation

In 25 % of countries, more than half of HEI are involved in JD cooperation

In half of the countries, less than 25% of HEI are involved in JD In 20% of countries no JD exist at all

Approx. 2500 <u>IP</u> running in the EHEA


